POLICY OF CHELSEA COMMUNITY FAIR  
CONCERNING THE USE OF THE GROUNDS DURING THE ANNUAL FAIR  
BY RELIGIOUS, POLITICAL, AND PUBLIC INTEREST GROUPS

The purpose of this policy is to accommodate religious, political, and public interest groups, candidates, and their representatives who desire to use the fair grounds during the annual Chelsea Community Fair in harmony with the other participants and to keep public order. All persons or groups desiring to use the fair grounds during the annual fair for religious, political, or public interest activities including solicitation and dissemination of literature, information or propaganda shall comply with the following rules and regulations:

1. All such religious, political, and public interest persons and groups shall register two weeks prior to the first day of the fair, with the office of the fair manager before commencement of their activities.
2. All such persons and groups shall pay the normal admission price to the fair.
3. All such persons and groups shall limit their activities to those areas which are normally open to the public.
4. All such persons and groups shall restrict their activities to the normal hours of the fair's operation.
5. All such persons and groups shall limit their activities to those areas where flow of traffic will not be impeded and where a safety hazard shall not be caused. The decision of the fair manager in designating the areas open to such activities shall be final.
6. All such persons and groups shall wear identification insignia.
7. Such persons and groups shall not solicit any donations or distribute or disseminate any information, literature or propaganda in the grandstand, ticket lines, exhibit areas, or any other area of the fair where the public is gathered in a restricted traffic area, or otherwise constitutes "a captive audience".
8. All such persons or groups shall not touch another person without his or her consent.

## **RULES AND REGULATIONS**

All exhibitors are subject to these rules (where they apply) and any changes.

Exhibitors are requested to volunteer their services to the superintendents for building set-up, clean-up, barn duty and overseeing of exhibits

1. All exhibits are open to everyone. However, the Fair Board reserves the right to refuse any entry not considered suitable, and, in the case of limited space, superintendents reserve the right to select exhibits. In the event of only two entries, the Judge reserves the right to combine two classes. Superintendent and Fair Board reserve the right to create or delete any or all classes, per discretion.
2. All entries must be made by, grown by or owned by the exhibitor. Entries must be a product of the past year or current season. No article may have been shown previously at the Chelsea Community Fair. An exception to the above rule may be found in the Floriculture Department, where a previously shown plant, with new growth, may be exhibited.
3. No one exhibitor may enter more than one article in each class, with the exception of the Poultry Department, Swine Department or Sheep Department.
4. Age of exhibitor is recognized as of August 31, unless specified different by club or department rules.
5. Rules and regulations for exhibits in the Green Building may be found at the beginning of premium lists for each department.
6. Exhibits must be properly identified. Entry Tags (available at the Fair Office) must accompany all exhibits.
7. Removal of exhibits will not be permitted in any area before 9:00 a.m. on Sunday, August 26th. Entries left after 11:00 a.m. without prior arrangements with the superintendent are left at the responsibility of the owner.
8. All livestock exhibitors must call the Superintendent of the Department by August 2nd to arrange for exhibit space.
9. All livestock must be entered before 12:00 Noon on Tuesday, August 21st.
10. All livestock exhibitors shall comply with the State Health Requirements printed in this book.
11. Each livestock exhibitor may show and sell a maximum of two (2) species.
12. Each individual exhibitor assumes all risk in exhibiting livestock and all other exhibits. Although reasonable precautions will be taken, the Chelsea Community Fair will not be responsible for any accident or loss. Ribbons are the responsibility and property of the exhibitor once awarded. Ribbons are given for all class placings.
13. Season Passes, Student Passes and Senior Citizen Passes (65 years and older) will be available at the Fair Service Center Office or may be purchased at the Gate.
14. Exhibitor Passes (for exhibitors of large livestock) will be available at the Fair Service Center office only. Only one (1) exhibitor pass will be sold per family.

#### RULES AND REGULATIONS (Cont.)

15. Decisions and rulings made by the Judge or Superintendent are final. However, protests may be made in writing and accompanied by a \$200.00 deposit. Protests will be accepted until the close of the Fair and considered within 10 days at a meeting of the Chelsea Fair Board. If supported, the deposit will be returned. In the event the outcome is not to the satisfaction of the protesting party, a protest may be filed with Michigan Department of Ag within 45 days of the initial complaint.
16. All premiums will be paid at the Fair Service Center Office (unless otherwise posted). Hours for payment will be posted. Please use your full name and correct address on your Entry Tags which must accompany your exhibit (available at Fair Office). All checks for premiums are void after 30 days. In the event Premium Funds received from the State of Michigan Department of Agriculture are reduced below 2006 level, or if fair receipts are insufficient to pay expenses and premiums in full, premiums may be prorated among those entitled to same.
17. No premium will be paid on breeds or articles not listed in the Fair Premium Book.
18. Promiscuous advertising is strictly prohibited. Exhibitors may advertise and distribute from their places of exhibit only. The distribution of advertising matter that conflicts in any manner with a space sold by the management is prohibited.
19. No exhibitor or concessionaire will be permitted to sublet or share any portion of the space allotted him. A violation of this rule will result in the original purchaser of space forfeiting all his rights and eviction of himself, partners, employees and wares from the Fairgrounds.
20. All Superintendents serve under the direction of the Chelsea Fair Board. All Superintendents shall be subject to a current fair year evaluation and appointment as a Superintendent for the next year's fair by the Chelsea Community Fair Board.
21. No coolers allowed on the grounds.
22. No pets allowed on the grounds.
23. ABSOLUTELY NO OVERNIGHT CAMPING ALLOWED ON THE FAIRGROUNDS.

## CODE OF CONDUCT

The Chelsea Community Fair Board has developed the following CODE OF CONDUCT as it relates to animal exhibitions at the Chelsea Community Fair.

The Chelsea Fair Board expect courteous and orderly conduct by exhibitors and attendants. Harassment, profanity or un-sportsmanlike conduct toward officials, judges, show managers, staff, superintendents or other exhibitors will not be tolerated.

### SPECIAL CONSIDERATION FOR HANDICAPPED YOUTH:

Special consideration in judging will be given to exhibitors identified on fair entry forms as having Handicap(s), (physical, mental, emotional, and/or learning), which affect their ability to compete Effectively with non-handicapped exhibitors.

During the fair it is the individual members responsibility to prepare his/her animal for show. Members may only be ASSISTED in this preparation by club leaders, club members, or immediate family members (parents, guardians, brothers, sisters).

All animals at the Chelsea Community Fair will be checked by the club superintendent(s) for proper identification prior to showing or sale.

All market livestock, after it is tagged and registered, as a club members animal, shall be kept at their place of residence. Any exception to this rule must receive approval from the Club Superintendent and/or the Chelsea Community Fair Livestock Rules Committee prior to the movement of the animal. Any tagged and registered animal may be inspected at the club members residence by the club superintendent or Livestock Rules Committee Member, given a one hour notice prior to inspection.

All exhibitors of livestock at the Chelsea Community Fair are expected to keep the area around their animal (pen/stall) clean and presentable for the duration of the fair. Exhibitors are also expected to properly care for his/her animal for the duration of the fair, (feed, water, clean bedding). Failure to properly care for their animal during the fair will cause the exhibitor to be disqualified from this years fair, and suspended from the next Chelsea Community Fair. Violation of this rule will be determined by the Chelsea Community Fair Livestock Rules Committee.

"COACHING" of a given exhibitor while he/she is in the show ring is PROHIBITED. Coaching includes, but is not limited to, providing any type of verbal and/or visual information/signals intended to direct the actions of a given exhibitor and thereby improve his/her potential for placing in the class. Exhibitors determined to be the intended recipient of said coaching activities may be disqualified from the class at the discretion of the Show Officials or Livestock Rules Committee.

An exhibitor and his/her animal may be excused from the ring, at the discretion of the judge or show superintendent if the behavior of the animal is deemed to be a safety hazard and/or is seriously affecting the ability of the other exhibitors to show their animals.

Animals entered in the showmanship classes are to be shown by the club member only. Since judging in the showmanship classes is based on the member's ability to fit and show his /her animal to its best advantage, adult assistance may only be provided to secure and return a "run away" animal to the exhibitor, with the assistance preferably being provided by show personnel.

Animals entered in the breeding stock or market livestock classes may be shown by someone other than the exhibitor (club member) in the event of a personal emergency or a scheduling conflict that prevents the exhibitor (club member) from being present to show his/her own animal. It is highly recommended that the "substitute exhibitor" be another club member. Any "substitute exhibitor" must first be approved by the club superintendent(s). Additionally, an adult may assist the exhibitor in the ring in the event of an unruly animal.

"Assistant handlers" will be allowed in the show ring in classes showing a pen of animals (sheep, swine).

**ANY VIOLATION OF THE FOLLOWING RULE WILL AUTOMATICALLY RESULT IN DISQUALIFICATION:**

*The use of any drug or chemical compound that is not approved by the Food and Drug Administration for use in meat animals is prohibited. The illegal administration of approved drugs and compounds is also prohibited. All animals entered in the Chelsea Community Fair are subject to blood, urine and tissue tests by the Livestock Rules Committee, FDA and USDA for illegal substances and substances that exceed the acceptable levels established by the United States Department of Agriculture, the Food and Drug Administration, the Food Animal Residue Avoidance Databank and Environmental Protection Agency. A positive test will result in disqualification. The exhibitor shall assume full responsibility for any violation of regulations related to drugs and medications to include withdrawal times and condemnation or carcasses due to drug rule-regulations violations. This includes forfeiture of all premiums and market value of animal. All premiums will be withheld until tests have been completed.*

Artificial means of adding, removing and/or remedying physical defects and/or conformation in animal exhibits including, but not limited to, lifting and/or filling under the skin; beating and/or striking and/or icing of an animal to make it tense its muscles and feel firmer when handled by the judges to determine amount and firmness of muscling and/or to "fill" an area as a result of swelling; use of pain inducing compounds and/or equipment; false switches; hair not growing naturally in the specific location; and painting, dyeing or bleaching of hair to change its color will be considered fraud and deception. The decision of the designated official(s) shall be final as to the existence of the above conditions; and, the animal(s) in question will be disqualified.

Show sticks, whips, bats, crops and spurs may be used in accordance with their intended use as show aids, as class rules allow. However, improper, abuse use of show aids will not be tolerated.

Tampering (altering) and/or misrepresentation as to ownership, breeding, age, preparation and/or other irregularity in exhibiting will be considered fraud and deception.

If the Chelsea Community Fair Livestock Rules Committee require any animal to be subject to examination and/or test as prescribed to determine if a substance has been administered to an animal to alter its conformation and/or temperament. Administering of said substances will be considered fraud and deception.

If an illegal substance (as defined in the paragraph above) is found to be present in urine, blood and/or tissue samples taken from a given exhibitor's animal(s), payment for said testing will be the responsibility of the exhibitor and/or his/her family. If tests for suspected illegal substances are negative, payment for said testing will be paid by the Chelsea Community Fair Board or the person making the formal complaint.

**ANIMAL EXHIBITOR DRESS CODE:**

Exhibitors may NOT wear medals/pins, shirts, T-shirts, jackets, coats or wearing apparel which display a farm name or title/award(s) won by the exhibitor, or which represent that the exhibitor is involved with an/or a name or member of a particular species/breed association while exhibiting in any animal classes at the Chelsea Community Fair. Exhibitors MAY wear clothing which represent membership in a particular Chelsea Community Fair Club.

**NOTE:** Volunteers working at the fair as show superintendents, announcers, ring stewards or judging clerks may NOT wear articles of clothing which associate them with a particular farm, or specie/breed association.

The intent of the animal exhibitor dress code is to make exhibitors as "equal" as possible when they enter the show ring with their animal(s), and to reduce the potential for the perception existing that a member may have received preferential treatment in class placing due to the exhibitor's "advertised" association with a particular farm and/or specie/breed association.

In a like fashion, the rule regarding volunteers assisting with fair livestock shows is intended to help protect the volunteer (and youth associated with him/her through family and/or farm) from the suggestion being made that his/her child or club member under his/her leadership received preferential treatment in class placing due to some "advertised" connection between the exhibitor and the volunteer working in the show ring.

#### PENALTIES FOR MISCONDUCT:

When satisfactory evidence has been obtained that a Chelsea Community Fair rule has been violated, and/or fraud and/or deception has occurred in association with exhibiting in the Chelsea Community Fair, any or all of the following actions may be taken:

1. The animal(s) in question shall be disqualified.
2. Any and/or all other animals or exhibits at the Chelsea Community Fair of the exhibitor may be disqualified.
3. All premiums, trophies, awards and/or money won by said exhibitor in any other Chelsea Community Fair department may be withdrawn.
4. The exhibitor and/or the exhibitor's family may be barred from club membership, and/or competition at the Chelsea Community Fair for a period up to life.

Should fraud or deception be discovered or if a Code of Conduct Rule is violated PRIOR TO FINAL PLACING BY THE JUDGE, the animal will be declared ineligible to show, and the exhibitor will be required to remove the animal(s) in question from the fairgrounds.

Should fraud or deception be discovered or if a Code of Conduct Rule is violated AFTER AN ANIMAL(S) HAS BEEN JUDGED, the placing(s) will be voided and the exhibitor required to remove the animal(s) in question from the fairgrounds. In the case of fraud or deception discovered after MARKET LIVESTOCK have been judged and prior to sale in the appropriate Chelsea Community Fair Livestock Sale, the placing(s) will be voided, and the animal(s) in question will not be permitted to sell in the sale. The exhibitor will be required to remove the market animal(s) in question from the fairgrounds.

Should fraud or deception be discovered or if a Code of Conduct Rule is violated AFTER A MARKET ANIMAL(S) HAS BEEN SOLD in the Chelsea Community Fair Livestock Sale, all sale money associated as a reward shall be removed from the total sale price of the animal(s) and retained by the Chelsea Community Fair Livestock Rules Committee as a penalty for the action. The money provided the exhibitor will be that of the sale day's market value as determined by a majority decision of the Chelsea Community Fair Board. Other animals will not be moved up in placing. In case any reward has already been awarded, the Chelsea Community Fair Board of Directors will require said exhibitor(s) to refund all premiums, trophies, awards, ribbons and/or sale money under the assessed penalty.

#### HANDLING OF COMPLAINTS:

Chelsea fair club members, leaders, and/or parents compelled to bring a Chelsea Community Fair rules violation complaint against a given member(s) will be required to complete and sign a Chelsea Community Fair Rules Violation Complaint Form, stating the reason(s) and alleged grounds for registering the complaint.

Any member(s) against whom a Chelsea Community Fair Rules violation complaint has been filed will have the right to read the complaint form.

The Chelsea Community Fair Livestock Rules Committee reserve the right to determine whether sufficient evidence exists to merit further action.

#### DUE PROCESS:

In question of rule(s) violation in association with exhibiting animals at the Chelsea Community Fair, the following due process will be used:

1. The exhibitor and/or parties involved will be questioned by the appropriate officials, regarding the alleged rule violation(s).
2. If it is felt a rule(s) violation has occurred, the Chelsea Community Fair Livestock Rules Committee will jointly decide if a ruling can be rendered immediately, or if the violation should be brought before

- the Chelsea Community Fair Board of Directors for a ruling.
3. If, for reasons of further inquiry, a decision regarding a rules violation claim cannot be rendered until some future time following the fair, all parties involved will be notified by certified mail, with return receipt, of the Chelsea Community Fair Livestock Rules Committee's decision.
  4. Club members have the right to appeal the levying of a Chelsea Community Fair rule(s) violation penalty(ies) associated with animal exhibition at the fair according to the following process:
    - a. The member must request a hearing before the Chelsea Community Fair Livestock Rules Committee. Request must be made in writing to the Chelsea Community Fair Board of Directors.
    - b. All parties involved will be notified by certified mail, with return receipt, of the hearing date, time and location.
    - c. All parties involved will have the right to present their case as to why he/she/they feel the penalty(ies) should be reconsidered.
    - d. All parties involved will be notified in writing within ten (10) business days by certified mail, with return receipt, of the Chelsea Community Fair Livestock Rules Committee's decision regarding the appeal.

#### SICK ANIMALS:

It is the exhibitors responsibility to obtain a veterinarian to care for their animal(s) if required.

The Chelsea Community Fair Livestock Rules Committee reserve the right to require a veterinarians opinion on the health and/or carcass marketability of any animal prior to the show and/or livestock sale.

#### LOADING OF AUCTIONED ANIMALS:

No animal will be loaded for transport without the approval of a Chelsea Community Fair Board Sale Committee or their designate.

#### RULES COMMITTEE:

A committee will be formed to review the Chelsea Community Fair Code of Conduct as it relates to animal exhibition at the Chelsea Community Fair. This committee will meet annually after the Chelsea Community Fair, and prior to the printing of the next years premium book. The committee shall be comprised of a minimum of three (3) members of the Chelsea Community Fair Board of Directors. Appointment to this committee will be by the President of the Chelsea Community Fair Board of Directors.

**2007 HEALTH REQUIREMENTS FOR \*LIVESTOCK EXHIBITED IN MICHIGAN**

(SUMMARY --- Extended version on file in Fair Office) The following is a summary of the health requirements for livestock exhibited in Michigan. The complete set of requirements can be obtained by downloading them from the Michigan Department of Agriculture website [www.michigan.gov/mda-exhibitinfo](http://www.michigan.gov/mda-exhibitinfo) or by contacting the fair/exposition staff or livestock entry office.

\* Livestock means those species of animals used for human food and fiber or those species of animals used for service to humans. Livestock includes but is not limited to cattle, sheep, new world camelids (llamas, alpacas, vicunas, and guanacos), goats, bison, captive cervidae, ratites (cassowaries, kiwis, ostriches, and emus), swine, equine, poultry, aquaculture, and rabbits. Livestock does not include dogs and cats.

**GENERAL**

Exhibitors at State, County, and District fairs, along with other livestock exhibitions, expositions, and shows, are required to comply with all of the statutory and regulatory provisions of the State of Michigan relating to animal health outlined in Act No. 466 of the Public Acts of 1988, as amended, and rules promulgated for the implementation and enforcement of the act.

1. A fair shall have an accredited veterinarian on call whenever there are animals on the premises during the fair. A fair, exhibition, exposition, or show authority shall do all of the following as described herein:
  - a. Notify exhibitors of health tests and certificates required for importation and exhibition in this state.
  - b. Examine and approve required health certificates, reports, test charts, certificates, or other required documentation before displaying, exhibiting, or stabling the animals in the exhibition area or before commingling with other animals.
  - c. Notify exhibitors whether or not poultry vaccinated against Infectious Laryngotracheitis (ILT) are allowed in the fair, exhibition or exposition or show
  - d. Assure that all participating equine test negative for Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA)
2. Livestock with clinical signs of infectious, contagious, or toxicological disease shall be removed from the fair, exhibition, exposition, or show or, by permission of the director, shall be isolated on the premises. Livestock that have known exposure to, or that show clinical signs of, infectious, contagious, or toxicological disease as determined by a veterinarian shall not be displayed or housed at a fair, exhibition, exposition, or show unless permission to do so is granted by the director. The fair, exhibition, exposition, or show authority is responsible for ensuring that the livestock are removed from the premises.
3. A fair, exhibition, exposition, or show authority may require additional testing or vaccination of animals before entry and during the fair, exhibition, exposition, or show.
4. A bird shall not be handled except by the exhibitor, attendant, fair veterinarian, director, or judge after the bird is placed in an exhibition coop.
- 5a. Starting March 1, 2007, all cattle moving to a show, sale, or exhibition are required to have an official radio frequency identification device (RFID) ear tag. Exhibitors may call the Michigan Department of Agriculture at 1-866-870-5136 to order RFID tags at a cost of \$2.00 each.
- 5b. All out-of-state cattle exhibited in Michigan shall be tagged with an official radio frequency identification device (RFID) ear tag. Tags can be ordered by calling Vickie McCune with RJ Matthews Co. at 330-834-3000, ext 2013 or by calling Amy Bledsoe with the Indiana Animal Health, Inc. at 219-279-2378
6. All goats, sheep, and privately-owned cervids shall bear official identification before they leave their home premises.
7. It is the responsibility of the exhibitor to ensure that all requirements for testing, identification, and official interstate health certificate or official interstate certificate of veterinary inspection are fulfilled prior to importation and that proof of fulfilling these requirements is provided to the director, fair,

- exhibition, exposition, or show authority upon request
8. Upon request, a person who exhibits livestock shall present for inspection all reports, test charts, and appropriate health certificates required to accompany the livestock.
  9. Out of state livestock for exhibition shall meet the requirements prescribed for importation of breeding animals of that species and shall be accompanied by a copy of an official interstate health certificate or an official interstate certificate of veterinary inspection issued by an accredited veterinarian from the state of origin. Livestock shall not be diverted to premises other than the destination site named on the official interstate health certificate.
  10. Whenever an official test is conducted or an official vaccination is administered, livestock shall, unless exempted by the director, be permanently identified in a manner approved by the director.
  11. Unless otherwise approved by the director, a facility for exhibition of livestock shall be constructed to allow sufficient separation of each exhibitor's livestock. The facility shall be constructed of a material that can be adequately cleaned and disinfected.
  12. An exhibition building or yarding facility shall be cleaned and disinfected with an United States Department of Agriculture approved disinfectant used in accordance with label instructions before livestock are admitted by removing from the premises all manure, litter, hay, straw, and forage from pens, runways and show rings, and thoroughly disinfecting walls, partitions, floors, mangers, awarding facilities, and runways in a manner approved by the director. MDA is currently using Virkon S for field activities. For a complete list of disinfectants, please refer to [www.michigan.gov/mda-exhibitinfo](http://www.michigan.gov/mda-exhibitinfo).
  13. Feed and water containers provided for exhibition coops shall be new or properly cleaned.
  14. A feed or water container from which a bird has eaten or drunk shall be refilled to prevent contamination of the common supply of feed and water. A feed or water container may not be removed from an exhibition coop except for the purpose of cleaning.
  15. An exhibition coop shall be thoroughly cleaned and disinfected before and after each exhibition.
  16. Primary enclosures and stall areas shall be constructed and placed to provide adequate light for proper inspection for evidence of transmissible diseases.
  17. Cage litter and bedding shall be clean and shall be replaced daily, or as often as needed.
  18. A shipping crate used in the shipment of birds by common carrier may not be used as an exhibition coop. Shipping crates shall be cleaned and disinfected on the day of arrival after the birds have been removed for exhibition and before being used again. Unless otherwise necessary, shipping crates shall not be stored in the exhibition area.
  19. Out-of-State livestock for exhibition shall meet the requirements prescribed for importation of breeding animals of that species and shall be accompanied by an official interstate health certificate or an official interstate certificate of veterinary inspection issued by an accredited veterinarian from the state of origin.

**2007 OUT OF STATE LIVESTOCK FOR EXHIBITION  
(SUMMARY --- Extended version on file in Fair Office)**

Out of state livestock for exhibition shall meet the requirements prescribed for importation of breeding animals of that species and shall be accompanied by an official interstate health certificate or an official interstate certificate of veterinary inspection issued by an accredited veterinarian from the state of origin. Livestock shall not be diverted to a premises other than the destination site named on the official interstate health certificate.

If vesicular stomatitis outbreaks have occurred in the state of origin within the past 30 days, the following statement must be included by the accredited veterinarian on any official interstate health certificate or official certificate of veterinary inspection for importation of equidae, cattle, sheep, goats, bison, New World camelids, swine, or privately owned cervidae into Michigan:

*"I have examined the animals listed on this certificate and have found no clinical signs of vesicular stomatitis. To the best of my knowledge, these animals have not been exposed to vesicular stomatitis within the previous 30 days, nor have they been vaccinated with vesicular stomatitis vaccine."*

All cattle, goats, and bison of any age and reproductive capability, unless transported directly to a USDA inspected slaughter facility, must be identified with a USDA approved official identification eartag, or official breed registration tattoo, prior to importation. An official breed registration tattoo may only be used if the animal is accompanied by the official breed registration certificate during the movement. The official

identification must be recorded on the required official interstate health certificate or official certificate of veterinary inspection.

Dairy cattle, breeding cattle, feeder heifers, horses and other equidae, breeding swine, feeder swine, market hogs, llamas, alpacas, privately-owned cervids, aquaculture, and wild animals for exhibition originating outside the state of Michigan shall meet the requirements found at [www.michigan.gov/mda-exhibitinfo](http://www.michigan.gov/mda-exhibitinfo) by contacting the fair/exposition staff or livestock entry office.

1. Please read general rules and regulations on page 12.
2. Exhibitor Fee is \$15 per exhibitor. This fee must be sent with the entry form, #9 below.
3. Each exhibitor can purchase an "exhibitor pass" from the fair office for \$25.00. This permits a vehicle and a driver onto the fairgrounds through the exhibitor/handicap gate. All other persons in the vehicle will be required to pay the daily fee or the season pass fee.
4. Age of exhibitor is determined as of January 1, 2007. Anyone 19 years old and younger as of January 1, 2007 is eligible to enter.
5. 4-H Rules will apply. Reference:4-H Horse & Pony Project Show Rules & Regulations (revised 2003). Jumping, Reining, and English/Western Riding Patterns from MIHA 2007 Rules & Regulations.
6. Stall space will be given first to horse/pony exhibitors of previous year (only if entries are received by the deadline). Residents of the Chelsea & Dexter School Districts will be given

second priority. If the barn does not fill with previous year exhibitors and Chelsea/Dexter exhibitors, entries from other local areas will be accepted. All entries received after August 1 will be placed "first come, first served" Please mail entries early as stalls are filled first come, first served.

Entry fee will be returned if a stall is not available.

7. Two horses per exhibitor allowed. A horse can be used by more than one rider. Additional riders must fill out an entry form, send negative coggins, and fee. They must be received by August 1, 2007, see #9 below.
8. A copy of the current year NEGATIVE COGGINS TEST must accompany entry form.

10. The classes listed will be split between Tuesday (Showmanship) Wednesday (English), Thursday (Western), and Friday (Contesting Patterns). Class order is subject to change. Show bills will be available on Monday of the fair. Classes will not begin before 9 a.m.
11. Saturday will be a day with fun classes, no pre-entry necessary. No premiums will be given but special prizes will be awarded. Classes will be posted in the barn. There will be a break for the parade.
12. There will be horse/pony costume class after the parade. Ribbons will be awarded, judged by the audience.
13. **Horses are to arrive between 4 pm and 9 pm on Monday August 20. The barn will be open all day Monday for decorating and bringing in tack boxes, etc...**
14. **All horses must remain on the fairgrounds until Sunday August 26. All stalls must be cleaned and decorations removed before 10 am Sunday August 26. Exhibitors are expected to help clean the barn on Sunday morning August 26. Anyone that does not help clean the barn may be subject to premium forfeit. Anyone leaving stalls not cleaned and/or decorations not removed may be subject to premium forfeit.**
15. **Stalls are to be cleaned every morning and through-out the day. If stalls are not properly taken care of the exhibitor/owner may be subject to premium forfeit.**
16. Each exhibitor will receive a packet with show bills, authorization forms, back number, etc... A parent or guardian's signature will be necessary to receive this packet of information.
17. Barn awards will be given. They will be judged for cleanliness of stalls and isle, along with politeness and attitude of exhibitors. Decision of the Barn Award Committee will be final.
18. Premiums: 1st place \$8, 2nd place \$7, 3rd place \$6, 4th place \$5. 5th to 10th place \$2 and ribbon awarded. A premium of \$2 per class will be given to each exhibitor 8 years old & under.

22. CHAMPIONSHIP classes: All 1st and 2nd place winners of each halter class & each showmanship class are to show in the appropriate championship class (8 yrs and under not eligible).
23. GRAND & RESERVE CHAMPION SHOWMANSHIP: This is only for showmanship exhibitors. The exhibitors in this class will be designated by the showmanship judge. They can be of any discipline and age division (except beginner and lead line).
24. **CONTESTING PLEASURE: These classes are meant for exhibitors with horses that they feel are not suitable for the regular pleasure classes.**  
**Contesting pleasure classes are #4029 to #4035 and #4103 to #4114.**  
**Contesting pattern classes are #4127 to #4186.**  
**You must enter 1 or more contesting pattern classes to participate in the contesting pleasure classes.**  
**You can enter just the contesting pattern classes and not a contesting pleasure class.**  
**You can enter both Western and Contesting Pleasure classes.**  
**If you enter contesting pattern classes under an English discipline you can participate**

**in the contesting pleasure classes but must wear the English discipline attire.**

**Attire for all contesting pleasure classes will be your contesting attire, NOT your western/english pleasure attire.**

**In contestng pleasure classes helmets are optional except for Hunt Seat exhibitors.**

**In the contesting pleasure riding classes your contesting tack is required. Martingales and tie downs are acceptable but NO bell boots, splint boots, (nothing on the horse's legs)**

**These contesting pleasure classes are not mandatory but used for the contesting high point awards.**

25. HIGH POINT AWARDS: Each age division (except beginner and lead line) will receive High Point and Reserve High Point awards for Hunt Seat, Saddle Seat, Western, and Contesting. Points will be given for all classes except championships and halter. The seat ridden in the pattern classes will determine which high point award. All contesting classes (pleasure & pattern) are combined for the contesting high point award. The attire worn in the pleasure driving classes will determine high point award.
26. SEI/ASTM approved helmet must be worn by all exhibitors riding hunt seat and contesting classes. A helmet must be worn anytime an exhibitor is riding hunt seat. SEI/ASTM approved helmet must be worn by all riders 8 yrs & under, **including leadline entries.**
27. Exhibitors 5 to 8 years old MUST have a handler (16 yrs & older) in the ring while showing. Exhibitors 4 yrs & under MUST be led in their class(es) by a handler 16 yrs & older.
28. An exhibitor/horse combination can participate only once per event. No re-rides will be granted because of broken equipment.
29. Appropriate dress for each event must be worn. Attire for all contesting pleasure classes will be your contesting attire, NOT your western/english pleasure attire. In the contesting pleasure classes helmets are optional except for hunt seat riders (see #24).
30. Ponies are considered to be 56 inches & under. No stallions (horse or pony) allowed.
31. Horses demonstrating signs of illness are subject to be sent home. If a veterinarian is needed, the owner/exhibitor will be responsible for all expenses. The Fair Management, Superintendents, Judges, and its helpers will not be responsible.
32. Horses are allowed in specified areas only: arena, specified wash rack, barn, and any other areas approved by the fair management. Horses should be in their stall when not in these areas.
33. No trailering in horses on show days. All horses showing during the fair are to remain on the fairgrounds through-out the fair.
34. There will be ABSOLUTELY NO OVER-NIGHT CAMPING on the FAIRGROUNDS. A few exhibitors and their parents /guardians will be allowed to stay the night in the horse barn. No other persons will be allowed to stay overnight.
35. During the fair, horse trailers may be parked against the fence, south of the barn, for the week for feed storage.
36. Unsportsmanlike conduct or inhumane treatment of animals will not be tolerated and may result in appropriate disciplinary action by the Superintendent and the Fair Management.
37. Gate warning for each class will be a strict 1 minute unless a tack change has been requested. Please notify the entry booth if a tack change is necessary.
38. Tack stalls will be provided. Absolutely no tack boxes will be allowed in the isles. Do not block off any isle for any reason. Horses are to be groomed and tacked in their stall. Chairs and tables are to be kept out of the isle ways. These rules are for safety reasons.

2. Contestants must provide the Superintendent with their Social Security Number.
3. The Antique Tractor Pulling Contest is limited to 1940 and earlier models.
4. All tractors must be weighed in at the Chelsea Fairgrounds on Thursday, August 23 between 7:30 a.m. and 11:00 a.m. Tractors in light class should be weighed by 8:30 a.m. Pull will begin at 9:00 a.m. **SHARP**. Tractor to be weighed with driver on the seat. Contest Officials reserve the right to re-weigh winners.
5. Entry fee is \$10.00. Percentage pull on cement slab.
6. All participants must be at least 14 years of age. Cards must be signed by parents of minors (under 18 years of age) before tractors will be weighed.
7. Class 2400 (Women's Powder Puff) will be first class to pull. Tractors are to be 1940 and earlier. Tractor and/or driver can enter in classes 2401-2404 after participating in the powder puff.
8. Tractors are allowed wheel weights or channel weights front and rear. Weights should be fastened securely and not interfere with hook. Any weights or objects falling from tractor during the pull will disqualify contestant.
9. Drawbar or point of pull not to exceed 18 inches from the grounds and no less than 18 inches from center of rear axle unless manufactured otherwise. Pull from factory drawbar or safe equipment.
10. Clevis to have 3 inches minimum hole for hook. A large twist clevis preferred. Homemade clevis should be 3/4 inch plate bolted tightly. D clevis will be allowed if bolted tightly, no shims.
11. No cut down smooth tires, no industrial tires, no wear between lugs, no dual wheels allowed. Wheels shall be size and type available at time of manufacture or early conversion from steel.
12. No 4 wheel drive, no altered tractors. Tractors must be complete such as hoods, air cleaners, etc.
13. Each driver allowed only one tractor in each class. Each tractor is limited to one class.
14. Driver will be allowed 30 seconds to complete their pull after starting. Two pulls will be allowed if needed. Second pull will be taken immediately after first pull. (unless mechanical failure) (first time 3 pulls if needed).
15. During the pull you are allowed to use brakes. You cannot shift up or down or disengage clutch, front wheels are not allowed to remain over 18 inches off the ground. Bouncing will be allowed if driver remains on seat. If chain jerks or is slack during pull, whistle will blow and pull is over.
16. RPM not exceed 15% of factory recommendations. MPH not to exceed 5 mph.
17. Tractor must have original looking block.
18. Same rules apply to all classes

**RULES**

1. Please read general rules and regulations beginning on page 12.
2. Contestants must provide the Superintendent with their Social Security Number.
3. Pull will begin at 9:00 a.m. **SHARP**. This is a dead-weight pull on cement for the first three classes. All tractors must be weighed in at Chelsea Fairgrounds according to the following schedule. Scales open at 8:00 a.m. Tractors up to 3,750 pounds (Class 2405) are to be weighed by 8:30 a.m.; Tractors in classes 2406 and 2407 to be weighed by 9:30 a.m. All tractors in classes 2408 - 2416 should be weighed in between 4:00 p.m. and 6:00 p.m.
4. Entry fee is \$15.00 for Farm Stock classes. Entry fee is \$20.00 for Super and Pro Stock.
5. All participants must be at least 14 years of age. Cards must be signed by parents of minors (under 18 years of age) before tractors will be weighed.
6. Contest is open to rubber tired, wheel type farm tractors. Not materially altered from original factory specifications. No 4-wheel drives. No cut down, smooth tires allowed. No wear between treads. No industrial or knobby tires.
7. Entry limited to one tractor per class, and one driver per tractor. Each tractor allowed in one class only.
8. Winner will be determined on a maximum deadweight basis. Tractor pulling greatest weight in each class will be the winner. Full pull is completed when marker is tipped over.
9. Drawbar height for classes 2405, 2406, and 2407 limited to 18 inches. Tractors over 6,000 pounds can have a drawbar height to 20". The drawbar cannot be raised after the pull has started. If you have to pull off more than once because of drawbar height, you will be disqualified. Must not be more than 1 inch of washers between drawbar and clevis.
10. Each contestant will receive three pulling chances at first weight, two pulling chances at each weight thereafter. Clevis should have 3 inch minimum hole for hook. Clevis to be flat and parallel to ground. Thirty second time limit per pull. No jerking allowed. Brake or differential lock can be used.
11. R.P.M.s will be checked on all tractors. Tractors may not exceed more than 15% over factory recommendations and not exceed 5 mph. If the R.P.M.s are too high, it will have to be changed before they pull or you will be disqualified. If the judge questions the R.P.M.s, they can also be checked after the pull.
12. Front end height will be no higher than 24 inches. The judge can and will stop the pull if they feel you are operating unsafely.
13. Wheelie bars can be on the tractor for safety, but if they touch the concrete, the pull is over.
14. Tractors will be weighed in with driver. No driver changes allowed after weigh-in. All weights to be bolted or affixed in a secure manner. If a weight is not secure, it must be made safe or taken off.
15. No modified tractors.
16. There cannot be any support of drawbar or clevis with a three-point hitch top link.
17. Absolutely no drinking of alcoholic beverages during contest either on or around Fairgrounds.
18. All rules will be interpreted by the superintendent and the official judges until the start of the contest, thereafter, the judges decision will be final.
19. The superintendent in charge of pull will have full power in any dispute or matter not covered in rules.
20. No standing on tractor during pull even if it appears driver is sitting in seat.

## **RULES FOR FARM STOCK-SPEED PULL EVENT**

**Friday Evening, August 24**

(Classes 2408 - 2416)

1. All tractors are to be farm owned and pulled as worked on the farm.
2. Contestants may use brakes, differential locks, torque converters and auto shifts.
3. No L.P. gas topper or pressurized tank.
4. All tractors must be in neutral or park while being hitched or unhitched.
5. All pulls must start with a tight hitch, no jerking permitted.
6. Contestants will be allowed two consecutive attempts within 75 feet to start the sled.
7. Number one puller will be test puller and may take pull if weight machine is operating properly, or he may pull in 3rd position. If machine needs further adjustment, first puller after each adjustment will be treated as number one puller. On any re-pull caused by a contest malfunction, puller, at his discretion, may drop back 3 positions.
8. Contestants will receive their number as they are weighed in. Once the class has started, no numbers will be distributed for that class. Contestant must pull in order drawn within 3 minutes of the time after sled is in readiness; any delay will mean disqualification.
9. Tractor and sled must remain within boundaries of course during the pull, or be disqualified.
10. No one is allowed on the track except for track officials and contestant; no helpers.
11. All tractors and drivers must re-weigh IMMEDIATELY after they have completed their pull. Any tractor found to be overweight will be disqualified. THIS RULE WILL BE STRICTLY ENFORCED.
12. A Farm Stock tractor is not allowed to exceed 15% over manufacturer's recommendations.
13. Tractors in classes 2415 and 2416 are to be farm stock field tractors, must have working PTO, no cut tires, cannot exceed 5 mph and will be the last classes to pull
14. Any protest must be accompanied by a \$200 protest fee.
15. When filling out entries, please include all information. Include name, mailing address, phone number and Social Security Number.
16. Must get number and register at time of weigh-in. If have not drawn, do not pull.
17. All rules will be interpreted by the superintendent and the official judges until the start of the contest. Thereafter, the judges decision will be final.
18. The superintendent in charge of pull will have full power in any dispute or matter not covered in rules.

3. If a showman has won top showman in more than one species, the showman shall choose which species they will compete in. They will inform the superintendent no later than Thursday at auction time.
4. If a showman has won top showman in more than one species the next showman in line of the species that the top showman is not competing in will compete in Sweepstakes.
5. If a top showman has won Sweepstakes in a previous year they will not be eligible to compete. The Sweepstakes participation will go to the next senior showman in line.
6. Each participant will have their own animal available for the competition. If this animal becomes unruly it will be the superintendent's decision to change animals.
7. Judges will be the responsibility of the superintendent and will be on a volunteer basis. (Should have had past experience showing the species at the Chelsea Fair.)
8. Each judge will have a preprinted score card for each participant.
9. Participants will start with their own species and will all start with an equal score. (i.e. 8 out of 10).
10. The score cards will be tallied when all participants have shown all species of animals.
11. Score cards will be tallied by not less than three different individuals.

Also beginning in 1992, a specific contract for the Chelsea Community Fair Queen was implemented which explains the Queens duties and the requirements that need to be fulfilled to be eligible for the \$1,000.00 Scholarship.

**PLEASE NOTE: Parade line up signs are placed in order to aid participants to their parade positions.**

**RULES**

1. Please read general rules and regulations beginning on page 12.
2. The parade is to begin at 1:00 p.m. sharp.
3. ALL CANDY THROWN DURING THE PARADE MUST NOT HAVE STICKS. ALSO ALL CANDY THROWN MUST BE THROWN TO THE CURB AND NOT DROPPED ALONG SIDE OF VEHICLE/FLOAT FOR SAFETY REASONS.
4. Each Queen candidate must have a float on which to ride and **float must have a permit**, in order to participate in the parade.
5. **Float permits may be obtained by calling Chelsea Fire Dept. at 475-8755, and leaving your Name, Your Address, The Name of the Organization, and a Phone Number at which you can be contacted. The permit will be mailed to you.** (See Float Participants Requirements on next page)
6. School bands are to form in the alley of the Municipal Parking lot off of East Street.
7. All horses and horse drawn vehicles are to line up on Park Street between Main and East Streets, facing east between 12:15 and 12:30 p.m. All riders are to keep the horses in the roadway, not on lawns and sidewalks. Failure to comply is cause to be removed from the parade.
8. NO STALLIONS OVER 1 YEAR OF AGE ALLOWED.
9. ALL HORSES MUST SHOW PROOF OF A NEGATIVE EIA TEST (better known as Coggins test)
10. All farm machinery is to line up on the east side of East Street from Park Street south, facing north.
11. All antique vehicles are to line up on the south side of Harrison Street, from East to Madison Streets, facing west.
12. All trucks and miscellaneous vehicles are to line up on East Street, from Park Street south, on westside.
13. Fire Trucks and Emergency Vehicles are to line up on the south side of Park, facing west, starting at East Street.
14. A motorcycle or minibike or ATV must be ridden in a safe manner. Riders 16 and younger need to be accompanying by adults, no "wheelies" or horse play.
15. NO BICYCLES will be allowed during the Chelsea Community Fair Parade.
16. Any unit in the parade not covered elsewhere in the above rules should contact one of the firemen for a starting place.
17. Any delays caused in parade by a parade entry, that entry will not be permitted back the following year.
18. Units are to be in their positions by 12:00 noon, except floats which are to be **completed** and in line, **with Judges Cards filled out by 11:00 a.m.** for judging. FLOATS ARRIVING AFTER 11:00 a.m. AND COMPLETED WILL NOT BE JUDGED. They must be completed and in line At 11:00 a.m. to be judged.
19. Floats are to line up on the north side of Park Street between East and Madison Streets, facing

west, tow vehicles must stay with floats at all times. All vehicles pulling floats are to be limited to two persons in the cars, this will help avoid accidents and help the appearance of the floats. All hitches are to have a nut holding the pin. The float prize winners will be posted immediately after the parade.

### FLOAT PARTICIPANTS REQUIREMENTS

1. All floats must be assembled on either a farm wagon or flat bed trailer able to be towed by a car, truck, or trailer.
2. All floats must be in position, and completely assembled and decorated by 11:00 a.m., unless you wish your float not be judged for placement or prize (No Exception)
3. A judging card must be completely filled out and presented at time of judging or points will be deducted.
4. Float Judges are to judge each float, not the Queen candidates or her court, unless they are part of the theme or design of the float.
5. If candy is thrown from the float, the candy must make it to the curb. **Candy with sticks is NOT allowed.** If this rule is not met, you will be asked to stop throwing the candy.
6. If children or other participants are part of the float theme, they must be with the float at the time of judging
7. The vehicle used to tow the float must be in place when the float lines up.
8. Driver of the tow vehicle must stay with the vehicle/float.
9. All floats must have a draw pin with safety pin in place or a ball hitch with a safety pin.
10. Floats or vehicle using a generator, that operates on flammable fuel, must have accessibility to a 5 lb. ABC type Fire Extinguisher in case of an emergency. This extinguisher must be readily accessible to a person on the float or in the vehicle.
11. The exhaust pipe on the generator, must be routed to remove the fumes away from the participants.
12. Driver of a self-propelled float must have a clear view of parade route.
13. A safety inspection will be conducted. The crew will inspect each float to confirm that all guidelines have been met. If any violations are found, the safety crew retains the right to have the float withdrawn from the parade. **The decision of the safety crew is final**
